## INDIFFERENCE—COMPLACENCY—APATHY

### The Greatest Privilege of a Free Born People, is to Transmit That Freedom to Their Children

**I**N these perilous times it is not unreasonable that our attention should be focused on the obvious dangers that threaten the peace and security of the land. But behind the obvious are dangers much more real, much more fundamental, and much more serious. In this atomic or hydrogen age, into which we have been catapulted with a suddenness so unexpected that the appalling consequences have not as yet been realized by the great mass of our people, we would be naive indeed to be blind to the seriousness of our position and the threat to our liberties from the Kremlin and its satellites. There can be little doubt that we are the prime objective of Soviet hatred, and that we are the one great world power that stands in the path of Communist aggression. We are hated because we are feared. We are feared because of our strength, our ingenuity, our production capabilities, our ideals.

Fear is usually the basis of hatred. Yet, however grave may be our dangers from without, much more serious are those dangers from within—indifference, complacency, apathy. These come from within, and have been gnawing at the vitals of our national social life for over 50 years.

Indifference to the use of the ballot on Election Day can have the result that many candidates will be elected to high office by a minority of registered or eligible voters. We see complacency in the face of corruption and national scandal. Apathy toward our



Churches is seen in the fact, that while large numbers have taken upon themselves the obligation of religion, the percentage who support the church with their prayers and with their attendance, is small.

A people that spends, as Mr. Hoover of the F.B.I. recently said, \$750.00 for pleasure for every \$1 contributed to Church purposes, have something to answer for. Speaking from the Christian standpoint, Ruskin was right when he said, "It is not that people disbelieve in Christ as that they neglect Him".

Neglect is only another phase of indifference. Any police officer knows very well that the principle cause of juvenile delinquency

is parental delinquency. And again, even in the sacred field of developing the character of our own children, indifference and apathy raise their unsightly heads. Endowed as we have been with an America based on the teachings of Christ—with a land flowing with milk and honey—we have relentlessly destroyed our forests, worn out our soil, and lowered the water gage all over the country. It is estimated by conservationists that 1/5 of our top soil already has gone down the gullies, into the rivers into the sea. Water has become a serious problem in many sections. The East is dotted with abandoned farms. The dust bowl is fresh in the minds of all who read and think. Yet, few seem to care, and we still go along our several ways, diligent in the pursuit of money, leisure, and luxury—tragic victims of an indifference, a complacency, and an apathy that threaten our very existence to a degree that no danger from without can ever equal.

Time is short and is running out. It behooves all of us to awaken; to cast off indifference; to supplant complacency with a realistic understanding of the facts of life no matter how agonizing they may be and to bury apathy so deep it will never rise again. In general, we should purge ourselves as a people of these insidious dangers that can destroy us if we do not first destroy them. And the time for each of us to revive eternal vigilance is NOW.
