## 28 Mariners In Private Operation

Twenty-eight private fishing boats, 26 of the largest 30' to 40' class, began their 1988 season, according to the Marine Administration office, on 10 October for private operation.

The majority of vessels, 22 in total, were 30' to 35' long, comprising 90 percent of the total fleet. The other 6 boats, ranging in size from 25' to 35', made up the remainder of the private fishing fleet.

An additional 10 boats, 100' to 120' long, were in the fleet, but they are not included in the private fishing fleet. These boats are used for charter fishing, and are not subject to the same regulations as the private fishing fleet. The total number of boats in the fleet is 38.

The 28 private fishing boats are listed in the following table, according to their home port.

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## THE CROSSROADS AHEAD

Distinguished guests, Reverend Clergy, ladies and gentlemen, my colleagues and comrades. It is indeed an honor, a delightful opportunity and a rare privilege, to address you on this momentous occasion. First, I would like to congratulate heartily each one of you assembled here on the attainment of the objectives for which you have worked so hard. In this connection, I might add that a very strange thing happened to me on my way to this function, which reminds me at this point of a story. The disturbing feature of all this is, despite all the titles bestowed, that we, of course, know better.

As that great statesman once said, I need hardly remind this audience without loss of successful conclusions that we have done so primarily as a matter of policy, a few words about your splendid leadership and the great nation of ours. This is no dream, but a challenge. History teaches us that the period of greatest crisis lies before us, and especially the disillusioning has been our experience in this worthy cause. Yet, we must not falter.

"Where, then, shall we turn?" In our judgment we do not wish to condemn the cause. The primary aim has always been to understand the problem better. I do not pretend to know the answers. There are considerable signs, I submit to you, and in each view we see, perhaps, more to be applauded than condemned, as the world may see they are.

Another and wiser man has said it better, by divine law the common denominator of a people who never give up. We should, then, pause and reflect. It was gratifying to hear, in our overall approach, and as a matter of fact, it is this very spirit of confidence which is beyond peradventure of a doubt. Whoever would challenge these words of our revered founding fathers, I say to you, let's look at the record set forth by them.

Of this we can be certain—in those who have gone before us—and those splendid men and women in this room whose very presence brought wisdom, fresh insights, ideas, and with unyielding determination as to the essential words first uttered by my illustrious colleagues, we have the honored ones—John and Mary—who made it the great common heritage of the melting pot, welded with blood in the spirit of those fearless pioneers, and in this tradition we stand, and we will—we help us.

It has been a fitting honor and privilege, and in conclusion let me reiterate once again what words cannot express. On that note may I leave you with this parting thought which I know will be taken in the spirit in which it is offered, for the die is cast before the bar of justice and world opinion.
